District of Kentucky, &c.

On this 21st day of August 1820 personally appeared in open Court ^{properly made} being a court of record for said District and County of Grant John Lawless aged seventy years on the 11th day of March next, resident in the County and District aforesaid, who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows; he enlisted in the regular service on the 10th day of August 1776 for the term of three years in the Company of Captain William Blackwell attached to the 11th Virginia Reg^t Commanded by Col. Morgan, in Fauquier County, Virginia, that he was in the Battle of Brandywine on the 11th day of September 1777, in the Battle of Germantown ^{at that time} under the Command of Capt. John Marshall, and other Battles of less note the dates not recollectd, and was then sent into Virginia with a detachment as Baggage guard, with plunder taken from Genl. Burgoine, under the Command of Colo. Buford, he was then put under the Command of Capt. Hogg, the Reg^t ^{no name} not recollectd, but Commanded by Colo. Parker, and sent into the State of Georgia where he served his time, and was discharged ^{on the 10th day of August 1779} at a Widow Marks' about

nine miles from Augusta between Augusta
and Savannah, that place being Head quarters
for Col. Parkers Army at that time; a receipt
to an original ^{outstanding} dated 15th day of February
1819 and a pension Certificate now in his
possession No 46. and I do solemnly swear
that I was a resident citizen of the United
States on the 18th day of March 1818, and
that I have not since that time by gift, sale
or in any manner disposed of my property
or any part thereof with intent thereby so to
diminish it as to bring myself within the
provisions of an act of Congress entitled "An
act to provide for certain persons engaged in
the Land and Naval services of the United
States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the
18th day of March 1818, and that I have not
nor has any person for me, in Trust, any
property or securities, contracts or Debts, due to
me; nor have I any income other than
what is contained in the Schedule hereto
annexed and by me subscribed, Viz;

The Statement of John Lawless on Oath
Resident in Pendleton County Kentucky
This Dependant States that he enlisted in to
the service of the United States in the year
1776 in August, ^{for three years} as a private in the Continental
line in the company of Capt. Blackwell of
the 11th Virginia Regiment commanded by Col.
Dan. Morgan (afterwards Gen. Morgan) in
Fauquier County Virginia, that he was at the
taking of Fort Mifflin and was detailed among
others to guard the ^{Arms} ~~fort~~ ^{to Little York in Pennsylvania} and
had a few days for his ~~stay~~ ^{stay} ~~until~~ ^{until} sooner called
upon and at the expiration of nine days of
his forage was called upon to march with
some 15 months men to the South under Capt
Hogg in Col. Parkers Regiment also of the regular Establish-
ment, and served the remainder of his time
mostly in Georgia and received an honorable
discharge from Col. Hopkins with about 40 miles
of ~~papers~~ ^{papers} which discharge he states he gave up to
an Officer in Richmond when he went to Richmond
to draw his rations money he states the Officers
name was ~~Morgan~~ ^{Morgan} and that he never
draw any bounty lands and he knows not that
his discharge is now in question and that from
his reduced Circumstances that he is in need of the
Assistance of his Country for Support.
